REIGNING CHAMPAIGN SINGLES CHAMPION KEVIN ANDERSON AND FORMER TOP 25 PLAYER TAYLOR DENT HEADLINE FIELD AT CHAMPAIGN-URBANA

Two-time NCAA singles champion Somdev Devvarman and rising Americans Michael McClune and Ryan Harrison among those scheduled to compete in qualifying

The JSM Challenger of Champaign-Urbana, which concludes the 2009 USTA Pro Circuit season, is in its 14th year—making it the seventh-longest running event on the men's Pro Circuit. It is also the second Challenger held in Illinois, joining \$50,000 Winnetka, and one of five Pro Circuit events in the state of Illinois during the 2009 season. The others are Futures events in Peoria, Godfrey and Decatur.

Past champions of Champaign include **Ivo Karlovic** ('01 singles), Americans **Mardy Fish** ('01, '02 doubles), **Robby Ginepri** ('02 singles) and **Paul Goldstein** ('03 singles).

This year's field includes: former University of Illinois All-American **Ryler DeHeart**; reigning Champaign singles champion **Kevin Anderson** and three-time Champaign doubles champion **Rajeev Ram**, all of whom won a doubles title for the University of Illinois; 2007 Champaign singles champion **Jesse Levine**; **Somdev Devvarman**, a two-time NCAA singles champion from the University of Virginia; **Jesse Witten** and 2000 Champaign doubles champion **Taylor Dent**, who both reached the third round at the 2009 US Open; the USTA Pro Circuit men's all-time leader in singles titles **Michael Russell**; former collegiate All-American and 2008 Champaign singles finalist **Kevin Kim**; and former USTA Boys' 18s champion **Scoville Jenkins**.

The USTA Pro Circuit, celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2009, is the largest

professional developmental tennis circuit in the world, consisting annually of more than 90 events and more than \$3 million in prize money. The USTA Pro Circuit serves as the pathway from the junior ranks to the ATP World Tour. The caliber of play at a \$50,000 men's Challenger is close to that of the ATP tour, and a player can earn a Top 100 ranking by playing solely Challengers.

The USTA Pro Circuit also serves as an integral part of the USTA's mission to grow and develop tennis in the United States, mixing top-level tennis with community initiatives designed to increase tennis participation. In fact, tennis participation is at its highest point in 15 years. Almost 27 million recreational tennis players took to the

courts last year in the United States, and the Sporting Goods Manufacturers Association found that tennis is the fastest-growing traditional sport in the country. Overall, participation in tennis has jumped 43 percent since 2000 and nearly 10 percent in the last year alone.

Players scheduled to compete in main draw include:

Kevin Kim, 31, of Newport Coast, Calif., is ranked No. 90. On the USTA Pro Circuit this year, Kim won \$50,000 Charlottesville, Va., and reached the semifinals at \$50,000 events in Carson, Calif., and Savannah, Ga. He also qualified for ATP events in Indian Wells and Miami, reaching the second round in Miami before falling to Roger Federer. This summer, Kim advanced to the quarterfinals of Newport on the ATP World Tour and the second round of the US Open. In 2008, Kim won \$75,000 Aptos, Calif., and \$50,000 Tulsa, Okla., giving him 10 career USTA Pro Circuit titles (eight singles). Kim was an All-American in singles and doubles in his only year at UCLA (1996-97), helping the Bruins to a USTA/ITA National Team Indoor title and the NCAA semifinals.

Rajeev Ram, 25, of Carmel, Ind., is ranked a career-high No. 97. Ram won his first ATP World Tour title this year at the Campbell's Hall of Fame Tennis Championships, in Newport, R.I. After losing in qualifying in Newport, Ram received a lucky loser spot in the main draw after Mardy Fish withdrew to replace Andy Roddick in the USA's Davis Cup quarterfinal in Croatia. He then won

five straight matches in the main draw to capture the title—defeating fellow American Sam Querrey in the final—and also won the doubles title with Jordan Kerr. On the USTA Pro Circuit this year, Ram reached the final of \$50,000 Baton Rouge, La., and the semifinals at \$50,000 Dallas. Ram broke into the Top 50 in the world doubles rankings in early 2009 after winning an ATP World Tour event in Chennai, India, with Eric Butorac and reaching the round of 16 at the Australian Open with Bobby Reynolds. Ram and Reynolds also won \$50,000 Baton Rouge, La. Ram teamed with Prakash Amritraj to win the title at \$50,000 Dallas and with David Martin to win at \$50,000 Tulsa, Okla. Overall, Ram has won 21 USTA Pro Circuit doubles titles in his career and recently played doubles with Andy Roddick at the Queen's Club in London. Ram played one semester of collegiate tennis at the University of Illinois, helping the Illini win their first NCAA title and post their first undefeated season (2003). He also won the NCAA doubles title that year.

Michael Russell, 31, of Houston, is ranked No. 100. Russell is the USTA Pro Circuit men's all-time leader in singles titles with 20. He also played one season for the University of Miami (1996-97), winning the ITA National Indoors. Russell has competed in all four Grand Slam events, making five US Open main draw appearances. His best showing at a Slam came at the 2001 French Open, where he lost in the round of 16 to eventual champion Gustavo Kuerten in five sets. In 2009, he reached the second round of ATP World Tour events at Indian Wells and Miami, as a qualifier at both.

Taylor Dent, 28, of Bradenton, Fla., is ranked No. 105. Dent finished in the year-end Top 35 every year from 2003-05 and climbed to a career-high No. 21 in 2005. But his career was nearly undone by a lingering back injury. To repair his back, Dent underwent three surgeries and missed almost two full years. He returned in late 2008, and his comeback has picked up steam in 2009. He played in the main draw at the 2009 Australian Open (his first Grand Slam appearance since 2006) and advanced to the second round in Indian Wells and the fourth round in Miami, where he defeated Nicolas Pietrangola and Tommy Robredo before losing to Roger Federer. He advanced to the third round at the 2009 US Open, before losing a night match to then-world No. 2 Andy Murray. Prior to his back surgery, Dent reached the fourth round at the US Open in 2003 and, in 2005, reached the third round at the Australian Open and the fourth round at Wimbledon. He has used the USTA Pro Circuit during his comeback to help steadily improve his ranking, winning the singles title at \$50,000 Tulsa, Okla., in September 2009. He is the son of former pro and 1974 Australian Open runner-up Phil Dent and is married to fellow pro Jennifer Hopkins.

Jesse Levine, 22, of Boca Raton, Fla., is ranked No. 117. He made the most of his time as a freshman at the University of Florida, compiling a 24-1 record in 2007. He went on to win three Challenger singles titles on the USTA Pro Circuit, including the \$75,000 event in Nashville, Tenn., in late 2007. In 2008, Levine was a quarterfinalist at the Olympus US Open Series event in New

Haven, Conn., and reached the second round at both the Australian Open and Wimbledon. A 2007-09 US Open wild card recipient, the left-hander had his best showing at 2009 Wimbledon, defeating 14th seed Marat Safin in reaching the third round as a qualifier. He then advanced to the quarterfinals at the ATP World Tour stop in Newport, R.I., two weeks later, and subsequently the second round at Olympus US Open Series events in Indianapolis and Los Angeles, and the US Open.

Somdev Dewarman, 24, of Charlottesville, Va., is ranked No. 124. Dewarman is a two-time NCAA singles champion (2007-08) from the University of Virginia. He led the USTA Pro Circuit with four singles titles in 2008 and also added three doubles titles. Dewarman improved from No. 1,020 to No. 204 from year-end 2007 to year-end 2008 and reached the ATP World Tour final in Chennai, India, in January of this year (defeating Carlos Moya and Ivo Karlovic en route). He recently qualified for the Olympus US Open Series event in Los Angeles. Dewarman also is a member of India's Davis Cup team.

Kevin Anderson, 23, of South Africa, is ranked No. 125. Anderson cracked the Top 100 in 2008 after advancing to the final at the ATP World Tour event in Las Vegas and defeating Novak Djokovic en route to the third round at the Sony Ericsson Open in Miami. He also won the \$50,000 USTA Pro Circuit Challenger in Champaign, Ill., and went 5-1 in Davis Cup for South Africa. In 2009, Anderson qualified

and advanced to the second round at Queen's Club on the ATP World Tour, won a Challenger in San Remo, Italy, and reached the final at \$50,000 Binghamton, N.Y., on the USTA Pro Circuit. At the University of Illinois, Anderson won the 2006 NCAA doubles title with Ryan Rowe, and the two teamed up again to return to the final in 2007.

Brendan Evans, 23, of Key Biscayne, Fla., is ranked No. 131. He has made a steady rise up the ladder, improving his year-end ranking each year. Evans recently reached the quarterfinals at the ATP World Tour event in Newport, R.I., defeating Robby Ginepri en route. Also this year, Evans has won Challengers in Noumea, New Caledonia, and Nottingham, England, and reached the final at the \$50,000 USTA Pro Circuit event in Dallas and qualified for Indian Wells. In doubles, he reached the semifinals at \$50,000 Carson, Calif., with Jesse Levine. Evans holds five career doubles titles and two USTA Pro Circuit singles titles. In 2004, Evans and fellow American Scott Oudsema teamed to win three of the four Grand Slam tournament junior doubles titles.

Robert Kendrick, 29, of Orlando, Fla. (born in Fresno), is ranked No. 144. He competed in all four Grand Slam events in 2009, advancing to the second round at both Roland Garros and the US Open. Earlier in the year, Kendrick qualified at Indian Wells, reaching the second round, and also at Miami, advancing to the third round. On the USTA Pro Circuit, he reached the semifinals of

\$50,000 Tallahassee, Fla., in April, losing to fellow American Donald Young in three sets. In 2008, Kendrick won back-to-back USTA Pro Circuit titles in \$50,000 Louisville, Ky., and \$75,000 Nashville, Tenn., and advanced to four Pro Circuit finals. He has won 11 career USTA Pro Circuit singles titles and 10 doubles titles. In 2001, Kendrick served as a practice partner for the U.S. Davis Cup team during the World Group first round against Switzerland. As a collegian, he earned All-America honors at the University of Washington in 1999 and Pepperdine University in 2000.

Michael Yani, 28, of Durham, N.C., (born in Singapore) is ranked a career-high No. 167. He won three consecutive qualifying matches at the 2009 US Open to enter the main draw, where he lost in the first round to Sam Querrey. Yani also strung together a series of impressive results in May and June, qualifying for the main draw at Wimbledon and, in order, reaching the semifinals in Sarasota, Fla., the final in Carson, Calif., and the semifinals in Yuba City, Calif., all \$50,000 events on the USTA Pro Circuit. He also recently reached the semifinals at \$75,000 Aptos, Calif., and \$50,000 Calabasas, Calif. In 2008, he won Yuba City singles and doubles for his first career Challenger singles title and followed that up by reaching the main draw of the Olympus US Open Series event at Cincinnati as a qualifier. The former Duke student holds nine career USTA Pro Circuit titles (five singles).

Jesse Witten, 26, of Naples, Fla., is ranked No. 170. At the 2009 US Open, Witten won three qualifying matches before defeating No. 30 Igor Andreev and No. 79 Maximo Gonzalez in the first and second rounds. He then pushed then-world No. 4 Novak Djokovic before losing in four sets in the third round. Witten has won three USTA Pro Circuit Futures events this year (\$15,000 Loomis, Calif., \$10,000 Plantation, Fla., and \$15,000 Harlingen, Texas). He also qualified for the \$50,000 Challenger in Carson, Calif., reaching the quarterfinals. In 2008, Witten reached the main draw of the ATP World Tour event at San Jose (through qualifying) before losing to fellow American Robby Ginepri. He finished his career at the University of Kentucky as the school's first five-time men's tennis All-American and one of only 11 four-time men's singles All-Americans in the history of college tennis. He reached the NCAA singles final as a freshman, losing to defending champion Matias Boeker.

2005 US Open boys' champion **Ryan Sweeting**, 22, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla. is ranked No. 175. Sweeting won his second career USTA Pro Circuit singles title earlier this year at the \$50,000 Challenger in Dallas. He also qualified for the main draw at the LA Tennis Open, an Olympus US Open Series event, where he advanced to the round of 16 before losing to eventual champion Sam Querrey. In doubles, Sweeting advanced to the final of the U.S. Men's Clay Court Championships in Houston with partner Jesse Levine, losing to the world No. 1 team of Bob and Mike Bryan. Sweeting has previously served as a practice partner for the U.S. Davis Cup team and reached the second round of singles at the 2006 US Open as a wild card.

Alex Kuznetsov, 22, of Tampa, Fla., is ranked No. 189. Kuznetsov was born in Kiev, Ukraine, where his grandfather was a handball champion. A former No. 4 player in the world junior rankings, Kuznetsov suffered a broken leg in a 2005 car accident and was sidelined the entire summer. He bounced back and advanced to the second round of the 2007 Australian Open. After struggling in 2008, he rebounded in 2009 to win his first USTA Pro Circuit Challenger in Winnetka, Ill., raising his ranking more than 150 places. Soon after, Kuznetsov advanced to the final of \$50,000

Lexington, Ky. He reached the round of 16 in doubles at the 2007 US Open with Jesse Levine.

Ryler DeHeart, 25, of Champaign, Ill., is ranked No. 252. DeHeart was an All-American at the University of Illinois (2006) and finished his college career as the all-time winningest singles player in Illini history. In 2008, he reached the second round of the US Open as a qualifier, losing a night match to top seed Rafael Nadal. Shortly thereafter, DeHeart underwent arthroscopic surgery and did not return to competitive tennis until March 2009. He won a Challenger in Yuba City, Calif., in June 2009 for his first title on the USTA Pro Circuit since 2007 and his third singles title overall.

Scoville Jenkins, 23, of Atlanta, is ranked No. 254. Jenkins opened the USTA Pro Circuit Challenger season with an appearance in the final at \$50,000 Carson, Calif., and the quarterfinals at \$50,000 events in Dallas and Winnetka, Ill. In April, he qualified and advanced to the round of 16 at the U.S. Clay Court Championships in Houston. In 2008, he advanced to the final in Winnetka and the semifinals at \$75,000 Aptos, Calif., in back-to-back events to move into the Top 200 for the first time. He also won three matches to qualify for the main draw at the 2008 French Open and played in the main draw of the 2008 US Open for the fifth consecutive year (three of those years he lost to either the No. 1 or the No. 2 seed). In 2004, Jenkins became the first African-American to win the USTA Boys' 18s championship.

Todd Widom, 26, of Coral Springs, Fla., is ranked No. 255. Widom qualified and reached the second round at Indian Wells (where he fell to David Ferrer, 6-4, 7-5) in March, and in February qualified and advanced to the quarterfinals at the ATP World Tour event in San Jose, defeating Robby Ginepri and Taylor Dent before falling to eventual winner Radek Stepanek in three sets. On the USTA Pro Circuit, he has reached the semifinals at the \$50,000 Challenger in Tulsa, Okla. In 2008, Widom won the doubles title at \$50,000 Winnetka, Ill., with Michael Yani and reached the final at three other Challengers. Widom spent two seasons at the University of Miami (Fla.), earning All-America honors both years before turning pro in 2003.

Players scheduled to compete in qualifying include:

Michael McClune, 20, of Irvine, Calif., is ranked a career-high No. 290. McClune recently won his fifth career USTA Pro Circuit singles title at \$15,000 Austin, Texas, in October. He also competed in the 2009 US Open qualifying draw, in which he won his first round match. McClune had a breakout season in 2007, winning the USTA Boys' 18s to earn a wild card into the main draw of the US Open and also winning the first two singles titles of his career on the USTA Pro Circuit—at \$15,000 Mansfield, Texas, and \$10,000 Costa Mesa, Calif. In April 2008, he served as a practice partner for the U.S. Davis Cup team that defeated France and also trained with Roger Federer in Dubai that spring.

Ryan Harrison, 17, of Bradenton, Fla., is ranked No. 375. Harrison peaked at No. 7 in the ITF World Junior Rankings in January 2008 following a semifinal finish at the Australian Open juniors. In April 2008, he made national headlines by knocking off world No. 95 Pablo Cuevas at the U.S. Clay Court Championships in Houston as a qualifier to become only the third 15-year-old to win an ATP match since 2000 (joining Rafael Nadal and Richard Gasquet). Harrison won his first professional title at the USTA Pro Circuit Futures event in Chico, Calif., in June, advanced to the final of \$10,000 Costa Mesa, Calif., in September, and followed that up with another singles title at \$10,000 Laguna Niguel, Calif.

Nicholas Monroe, 27, of Chapel Hill, N.C., is ranked No. 494. He has won 20 Circuit-level titles in his career, including an ITF Futures event in Mexico in January and the doubles title at \$50,000 Yuba City, Calif., in 2008 with partner Michael Yani. In 2009 on the USTA Pro Circuit, Monroe reached the final at \$15,000 Brownsville, Texas. He also reached the doubles semifinals of \$50,000 Yuba City, Calif., with Brian Battistone. Monroe was a two-time All-American at the University of North Carolina (2003-2004).



With more than 90 tournaments throughout the country and prize money ranging from \$10,000 to \$100,000, the USTA Pro Circuit is the pathway to the US Open and tour-level competition for aspiring tennis players and a frequent battleground for established professionals. Last year, more than 1,000 men and women from more than 70 countries competed on the USTA Pro Circuit for approximately \$3.2 million in prize money and valuable ATP and WTA Tour ranking points. **Maria Sharapova**, **Andy Roddick**, **James Blake**, **Jelena Jankovic**, **Andy Murray**, **David Nalbandian** and **Jo-Wilfried Tsonga** are among today's top stars who began their careers on the USTA Pro Circuit. The USTA Pro Circuit is world-class tennis administered on the local level and played on local tennis courts as part of the fabric of communities nationwide—an opportunity for current and new fans to experience the excitement and intensity of the professional game in their neighborhood.
